This information pertains to one of the Training and Dialogue Programs of the Japan International Cooperation Agency (JICA), which shall be implemented as part of the Official Development Assistance of the Government of Japan based on bilateral agreement between both Governments.

I. Concept

Background

Climate Change and its effects have already become obvious all over the world. The Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) states in their Summary for Policy Makers (SPM) of the Fourth Assessment Report (AR4) that the “warming of the climate system is unequivocal, as is now evident from observations of increases in global average air and ocean temperatures, widespread melting of snow and ice, and rising global average sea level”. Climate Change has been affecting the climate system of cryosphere, as well as mountain glaciers and ecosystems of the land and the sea.

Mitigation measures, namely reduction in emissions and enhancement of the removals of greenhouse gases, are now urgently required to address Climate Change. However, even if various efforts for mitigation are quickly promoted, it will take some time before the effects of such efforts are realized in the global climate system. During this time, the impact of Climate Change upon the globe is inevitable. Therefore, “Adaptation Measures” for responding to these unavoidable impacts are critical.

In order to minimize the negative impacts of Climate Change against human society, it is more effective to promote well planned adaptation measures in advance rather than responding to actual impacts when they occur.

This training program aims to strengthen the adaptive capacity to Climate Change of participants’ respective countries.

For what?

This program aims to consider and to elaborate Action Plan of adaptation to Climate Change based on impact assessment and vulnerability assessment in participants’ respective organizations.

For whom?

This program is offered to an officer in charge of planning and implementation of adaptation to Climate Change in national (or local) governmental office. (Preferably be an officer in national focal point of UNFCCC, who is in charge of coordination of adaptation issues in respective countries)

How?

Participants shall have opportunities in Japan to learn and identify approaches and strategies to strengthen their adaptive capacity for achieving sustainable development in respective countries. Participants formulate Action Plan describing what participants will do after they go back to their home countries with putting the knowledge and ideas acquired and discussed in Japan.

II. Description

3. Target Regions or Countries:

Fifteen (15) Countries;

Argentine Republic, Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka, Federal Republic of Nigeria, Kingdom of Morocco, Kingdom of Tonga, Plurinational State of Bolivia, Republic of Chile, Republic of Ecuador, Republic of Serbia, Republic of Seychelles, Republic of South Africa, Republic of the Fiji Islands, Republic of the Marshall Islands, United Mexican States and United Republic of Tanzania

4. Eligible / Target Organization:

This program is designed for a national (or local) governmental office which is involved in adaptation to Climate Change, preferably Focal Point of UNFCCC.

5. Total Number of Participants:

Seventeen(17) participants from Argentine Republic, Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka, Federal Republic of Nigeria, Kingdom of Morocco, Kingdom of Tonga, Republic of Bolivia, Republic of Chile (2), Republic of Ecuador, Republic of Serbia (2), Republic of Seychelles, Republic of South Africa, Republic of the Fiji Islands, Republic of the Marshall Islands, United Mexican States and United Republic of Tanzania in total are expected to participate in this training program.

6. Language to be used in this program:

English

7. Overall Goal:

“Adaptation Measures” will be implemented in respective countries based on the proposed Action Plan by strengthening participants’ and their colleagues’ adaptive capacity to Climate Change.

8. Program Objective:

This program aims to consider and to elaborate Action Plan of adaptation to Climate Change based on impact assessment and vulnerability assessment in participants’ respective organizations.

9. Outputs:

Participants are expected to achieve the following outputs;

- (1) To understand the current situation on adaptation to Climate Change in respective countries.
- (2) To understand the overview of international framework and Japan’s policy on adaptation to Climate Change.
- (3) To understand the factors for adaptive capacity, impact assessment and vulnerability assessment on Climate Change and forecast of future Climate Change as well as understanding Japanese measures, technology, cases on adaptation to Climate Change, and the way of cooperation for developing countries.
- (4) To formulate Action Plan for solving the problems on adaptation to Climate Change in respective countries.

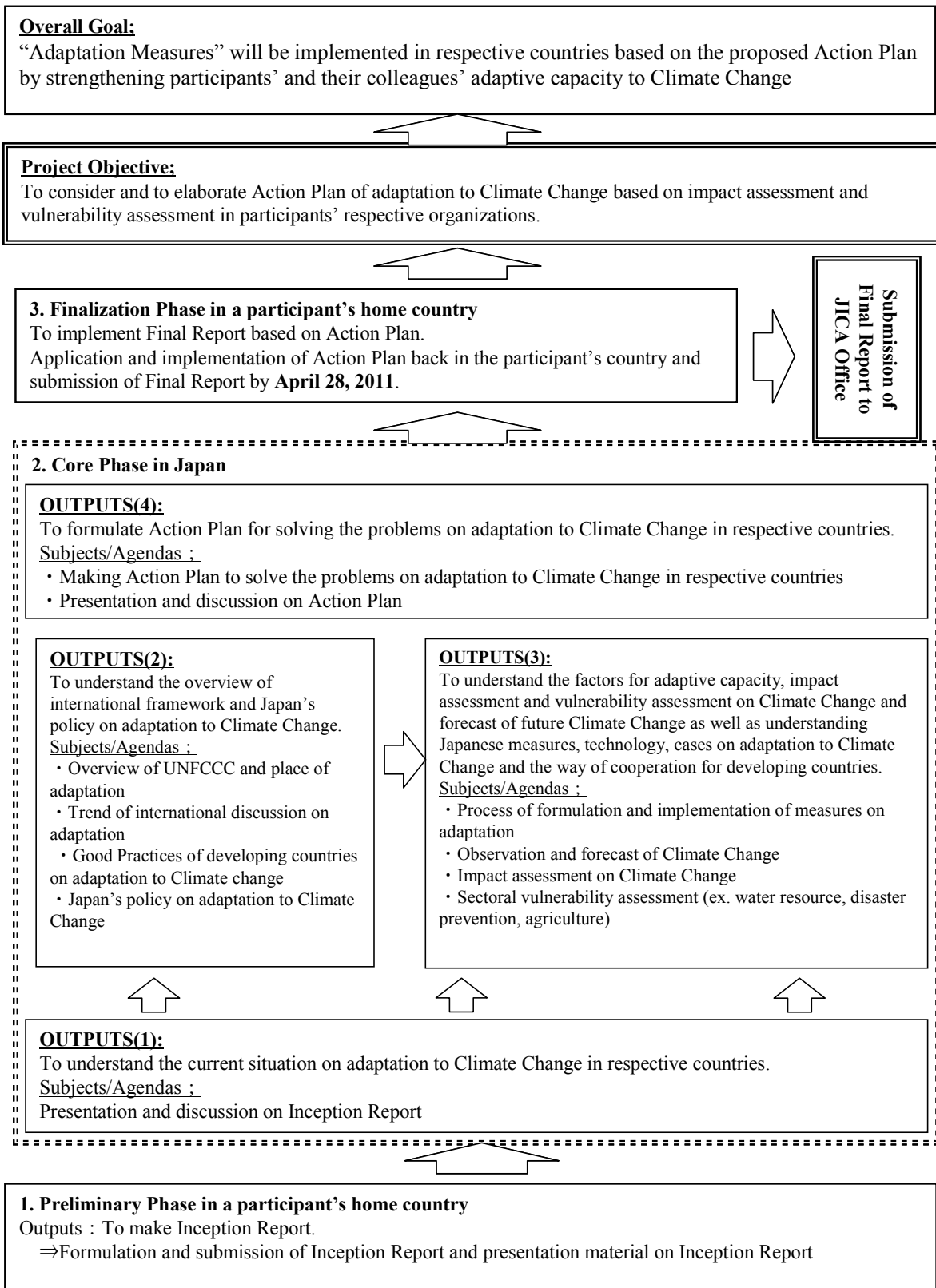

III. Conditions and Procedures for Application

1. Expectations for the Participating Organizations:

- (1) This program is designed primarily for organizations that intend to address specific issues or problems identified in their operation. Participating organizations are expected to use the project for those specific purposes.
- (2) This program is enriched with contents and facilitation schemes specially developed in collaboration with relevant prominent organizations in Japan. These special features enable the project to meet specific requirements of applying organizations and effectively facilitate them toward solutions for the issues and problems.
- (3) As this program is designed to facilitate organizations to come up with concrete solutions for their issues, participating organizations are expected to make due preparation before dispatching their participants to Japan by carrying out the activities of the Preliminary Phase described in section II-10.
- (4) Participating organizations are also expected to make the best use of the results achieved by their participants in Japan by carrying out the activities of the Finalization Phase described in section II-10.

2. Nominee Qualifications:

Applying Organizations are expected to select nominees who meet the following qualifications.

- (1) Current Duties: be an officer in charge of planning and implementation of adaptation to Climate Change in national (or local) governmental office.
(Preferably be an officer in national focal point of UNFCCC, who is in charge of coordination of adaptation issues in respective countries)
- (2) Experience in the relevant field: have more than 3 years' experience.
- (3) Educational Background: be university graduates or have an equivalent academic background.
- (4) Language: have a competent command of spoken and written English which is equal to TOEFL CBT 173 or more (This training program includes active participation in discussions and development of Action Plan, thus requires high competence of English ability both in conversation and composition. Please attach an official certificate for English ability such as TOEFL, TOEIC etc, if possible)
- (5) Computer skill: be proficient in MS Word, Excel and Power Point.
- (6) Health: must be in good health, both physically and mentally, to participate in the Program in Japan.

* Pregnant participants are strictly requested to complete the required procedures before departure in order to minimize the risk for their health. The procedures include ①letter of the participant's consent to bear economic and physical risks ②letter of permission from the participant's supervisor ③letter of consent from your Embassy in Japan,

- ④ medical certificate. Please ask National Staffs in JICA office for the details.
- (7) Must not be serving any form of military service.

3. Required Documents for Application:

(1) Application Form:

Regarding the Format of Application Form, please make contact with the respective countries' JICA office.

(2) Nominee's English Score Sheet:

To be submitted with the Application Form. If you have any official documentation of English ability (e.g., TOEFL, TOEIC, IELTS), please attach it (or a copy) to the application form.

(3) Inception Report:

Applicants should prepare Inception Report according to *ANNEX* and submit it with the Application Form. The Application Form without the proposals will be rejected.

4. Procedure for Application and Selection:

(1) Submitting the Application Documents:

Closing date for application to the JICA Center in JAPAN: **July 28, 2010**.

Note: Please confirm the closing date set by the respective countries' JICA office or Embassy of Japan of your country to meet the final date in Japan.

(2) Selection:

After receiving the document(s) through due administrative procedures in the respective government, the respective countries' JICA office (or Japanese Embassy) shall conduct screenings, and send the documents to JICA Center in charge in Japan, which organizes this project. Selection shall be made by JICA Center in consultation with the organizations concerned in Japan based on submitted documents according to qualifications.

The organization with intention to utilize the opportunity of this program will be highly valued in the selection.

(3) Notice of Acceptance:

Notification of results shall be made by the respective countries' JICA office (or Embassy of Japan) to the respective Government by **not later than August 20, 2010**.

5. Documents to be submitted by accepted participants:

Before coming to Japan, only accepted participants are required to prepare the following materials;

Presentation material on Inception Report:

Participants will be requested to make a presentation (within 20 minutes) and discuss on their Inception Report in group discussion session at the beginning of the training

program. Accepted participants are requested to improve the contents of Inception Report. And they are requested to submit the presentation material not later than **September 17, 2010.**

6. Conditions for Attendance:

- (1) to observe the schedule of the program,
- (2) not to change the program subjects or extend the period of stay in Japan,
- (3) not to bring any members of their family,
- (4) to return to their home countries at the end of the program in Japan according to the travel schedule designated by JICA,
- (5) to refrain from engaging in political activities, or any form of employment for profit or gain,
- (6) to observe the rules and regulations of their place of accommodation and not to change the accommodation designated by JICA, and
- (7) to participate the whole program including a preparatory phase prior to the program in Japan. Applying organizations, after receiving notice of acceptance for their nominees, are expected to carry out the actions described in section II-10 and section III-5.

4. Expenses:

The following expenses will be provided for the participants by JICA:

- (1) Allowances for accommodation, living expenses, outfit, and shipping
- (2) Expenses for study tours (basically in the form of train tickets).
- (3) Free medical care for participants who become ill after arriving in Japan (costs related to pre-existing illness, pregnancy, or dental treatment are not included)
- (4) Expenses for program implementation, including materials

5. Pre-departure Orientation:

A pre-departure orientation will be held at the respective country’s JICA office (or Japanese Embassy), to provide participants with details on travel to Japan, conditions of the workshop, and other matters.

Inception Report should be typewritten in English on A4 size paper (21 cm x 29.5 cm) in single spacing at maximum of 10 pages.

Only accepted applicants are required to prepare the presentation material of Inception Report based on the one submitted with the Application Form. The deadline is **September 17, 2010**.

The presentation material should be made by PowerPoint at maximum of 20 slides. Participants are requested to make a presentation of Inception Report within 20 minutes per person at the beginning of the training course in Japan.

For Your Reference

JICA and Capacity Development

The key concept underpinning JICA operations since its establishment in 1974 has been the conviction that “capacity development” is central to the socioeconomic development of any country, regardless of the specific operational scheme one may be undertaking, i.e. expert assignments, development projects, development study projects, training programs, JOCV programs, etc.

Within this wide range of programs, Training Programs have long occupied an important place in JICA operations. Conducted in Japan, they provide partner countries with opportunities to acquire practical knowledge accumulated in Japanese society. Participants dispatched by partner countries might find useful knowledge and re-create their own knowledge for enhancement of their own capacity or that of the organization and society to which they belong.

About 460 pre-organized programs cover a wide range of professional fields, ranging from education, health, infrastructure, energy, trade and finance, to agriculture, rural development, gender mainstreaming, and environmental protection. A variety of programs are being customized to address the specific needs of different target organizations, such as policy-making organizations, service provision organizations, as well as research and academic institutions. Some programs are organized to target a certain group of countries with similar developmental challenges.

Japanese Development Experience

Japan was the first non-Western country to successfully modernize its society and industrialize its economy. At the core of this process, which started more than 140 years ago, was the “*adopt and adapt*” concept by which a wide range of appropriate skills and knowledge have been imported from developed countries; these skills and knowledge have been adapted and/or improved using local skills, knowledge and initiatives. They finally became internalized in Japanese society to suit its local needs and conditions.

From engineering technology to production management methods, most of the know-how that has enabled Japan to become what it is today has emanated from this “*adoption and adaptation*” process, which, of course, has been accompanied by countless failures and errors behind the success stories. We presume that such experiences, both successful and unsuccessful, will be useful to our partners who are trying to address the challenges currently faced by developing countries.

However, it is rather challenging to share with our partners this whole body of Japan’s developmental experience. This difficulty has to do, in part, with the challenge of explaining a body of “tacit knowledge,” a type of knowledge that cannot fully be expressed in words or numbers. Adding to this difficulty are the social and cultural systems of Japan that vastly differ from those of other Western industrialized countries, and hence still remain unfamiliar to many partner countries. Simply stated, coming to Japan might be one way of overcoming such a cultural gap.

JICA, therefore, would like to invite as many leaders of partner countries as possible to come and visit us, to mingle with the Japanese people, and witness the advantages as well as the disadvantages of Japanese systems, so that integration of their findings might help them reach their developmental objectives.
